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# Double dummy by Nick Hughes

This is not an insult but a type of card play puzzle, popular last century. You were presented a hand – contract and opening lead - with all 52 cards in view. You task was to decide whether the contract could be made and how. Take this:

If West had led a spade, you could have made 12 tricks by playing ♣A-another. That allows you to ruff your two small clubs in dummy.

However, West led a trump. Now you have a problem. If you play on club, West will lead another trump, restricting you to one club ruff.

Can you make something of dummy's diamonds? (Double dummy answer)

This is very tough. Playing clubs doesn't work, nor is it any good to play of the ◆AKQ straight away. West would ruff and you would lose to the ♣K in the end. The blockage in diamonds is the problem. (If the ◆Q and ◆J were swapped, you would have 12 top tricks). The answer is to win the opening trump lead in dummy, then lead a spade!

What good does that do? Instead of ruffing the spade, you discard a diamond!

East will win the ♠A and switch to a club. You win the ace, play off the ♠AK as West has to follow, then draw trumps ending in dummy. You make six hearts, five diamonds and the ♣A.

Isn't that fancy?

A fistful of clubs. We aren't going to pass, but what's the right level to open?

**Giura**: 5♣. Someone will step in it; it might be good to watch.

**Hughes**: 5♣. Give the other three players a problem.

That reminds me of an old joke: if left hand opponent is LHO, and right hand opponent is RHO, what is partner? Answer: CHO = centre hand opponent. (But I don't think 5\,\text{\text{\text{w}}} will worry partner.)

**Fahrer**: 5♣. First seat and non-vulnerable is the perfect time to act.

**Browne**: 5♣. Being dealer, an aggressive preempt may make life tough on either or both of your opponents, and you are not vulnerable with a great eight-card suit. Your spade holding suggests the opponents may wish to bid/play 4♠, and you don't want that. On the downside, the opponents are also non-vulnerable so you can afford to go only two down doubled if you are to show a profit against their likely game. I would feel a lot better about opening 5♣ if the opponents were vulnerable.

Yes, it's a 6 loser hand, or  $5\frac{1}{2}$  if you take a rosy view of **Q107**. Give partner one trick and you may be three off in  $5\frac{1}{2}$  for -500, that's no good against their presumed +420 or 450 in  $4\frac{1}{2}$ .

**Rigal**: 4♣. Too extreme to open 3♣, so the choice is between 4♣ and 5♣. I could go either way.

**Klinger**: 4♣. A bit strong for that action, but 1♣ gives the opposition too much room to find their best spot and 5♣ leaves them no room to find the wrong spot. 5♣ will usually just be doubled. After 4♣, partner might be able to double their choice. If 5♣ is right partner can bid it.

I remember reading similar advice somewhere, a long time ago. It may have even been from Ron. The argument is that when you open 5-minor, it doesn't usually give your opponent holding a good hand a problem, as it's rarely right to bid 5 over 5 and especially not on the first round. So over a 5♣ or 5♦ opening, good players generally just double and "take whatever penalty is on offer".

**Zines**: 3♣. Increasingly, modern style suggests 1♣ on this 5-loser hand. I'm a dinosaur and underbid one trick by opening 3♣. Might try 1♣ at favourable vulnerability, and 4♣ at unfavourable.

The deal was played online. Partner had a 1-7-4-1 hand shape with only  $\forall$ KJ of hearts and  $\diamond$ J as honour cards. South opened  $4\clubsuit$ , passed around to east holding a 7-1-4-1 pattern, who bid  $4\spadesuit$ . West checked for key-cards and bid the cold  $6\spadesuit$  contract. Partner being that weak was unlikely, so maybe opening  $5\clubsuit$  would have worked better. Even after  $5\clubsuit$ , I think they would still find  $6\spadesuit$ .
