

# **Trumps Update**

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# Intra-esting

The deal for this issue, submitted by Nick Hughes, was one that piqued his interest when he was playing on BBO.

**Dealer**: South, Nil vul. **Contract**: 4♥ by South. **Lead**: ♦J.

A straight forward auction saw North-South reach a marginal game contract. West led the jack of diamonds.

How do you plan the hand as declarer in 4♥?

There are two losers in clubs and a deep loser in diamonds and another in spades. The clubs are ready to be lost off the top as soon as the opponents get the lead and play clubs, but you have a bit of time to try to do something with one of the other losers.

Declarer came up with a plan, drawing trumps then ducking a spade. If the suit divided 3-3 the fourth round would come good to provide a parking place for (say) the diamond loser. However the odds of a 3-3 break are only 36% and this time spades were divided 4-2 (48% chance).

There are many different finessing card combinations encountered at the bridge table. Success on this hand required an understanding of a radically different type of finesse called the "intra-finesse", where the first finesse does not expect to create an extra trick but rather to set the stage to pin a big card on the next round. Let's see how it works.


Draw trumps in three rounds, finishing in dummy. Next lead a spade and (if second player plays low, in this case the ♠6) insert the ♠9, the so-called intra-finesse. This loses to the ♠10.

Say that West persists with diamonds. You win and might play hearts just to force enemy discards but then you cash the ♠K and see the ♠J drop from East.

You do not know the spade layout for sure. There are two relevant holdings possible in spades. East may have started with the Q-J-6 but is more likely to have started with J-6. With Q-J-6, East may have split honours on the first round of spades, and also could have thrown the queen instead of jack on the second round (the principle of restricted choice – with only J-6, East has no choice as to which honour to play on the second round).

Going with the odds, you assume East started with J-6 and now has no more spades, so you lead your ♠3 to finesse to the ♠8, which wins, giving you the extra trick needed for the contract. The full hand was:

**Dealer**: South, Nil vul. **Contract**: 4H by South. **Lead**: ♦J.



Note that West could have thrown declarer off the scent by winning the first round of spades with the queen. Declarer would then have assumed that the ♠10 "must" be with East, and would therefore not have tried finessing to the ♠8 and would thus have been defeated. At the table, only a world class player (or a beginner) would find that odd play.



# Bidding Forum moderated by Alex Kemeny

You are South with the hand shown. Choose a call then compare with the experts. On our panel, Derrick Browne and leading world bridge authorities Barry Rigal and Ron Klinger are joined by Nick Fahrer from The Bridge Shop, world number one BBO bidding forum winner and 2024 Australian Bridge bidding forum reader top scorer Alexander Cook, and NSW reps Nick Hughes and Nicoleta Giura.

Partner has opened but we seem to have no way or replying in a natural way. Should we just pass? None of the panel chose to pass. Why? Because with 8 points, maybe if partner is strong we can even make a game, or else perhaps we can find a better spot.

**Browne:** 1NT. I play inverted minors whereby a raise to 2♦ shows a fit and over 10 points, so I can't do that. In my methods, 3♣ doesn't show this hand, so I have no choice but to settle for 1NT.

**Cook:** 1NT. Not happy with my call but other options are worse. As a passed hand I could bid 2♣ or even 3♣ (invitational) but partner will bid 2NT or 3NT when it is too much. I don't want to encourage partner to bid 2NT or 3NT.

Yes, even as a passed hand, a 2 over 1 change of suit should show a maximum pass.

**Fahrer:** 1NT - the least of all evils. Not strong enough for 2♣, not enough diamonds for 2♦. Bidding 1♥ has some appeal (yes.... even with three!).

Normally, a 1NT reply should not be made with a singleton in an unbid major, but most of the panel went down that path. Nicoleta and Ron remind us of the requirements for a 1NT reply:

**Giura:** 1NT. Shows 6 to 9 high card points and denies a four-card major. I have respect for the 2♣ bidders. Your long-time partner Nick will be pleased with that, see his choice below ♥

Klinger: 1NT. Standard, 6-9 points. Shows 4+ clubs. Might cut the opponents out of spades.

A 1NT reply doesn't say what you have, it tells partner what you <u>don't</u> have: "I don't have a hand good enough to change suit at the 2 level, and also I have no major to show at the 1-level and probably no fit for your suit".

**Hughes:** 2♣. Sounds like partner has a good hand. Don't want to wrong-side 3NT.

Why does Nick suspect partner has a good hand? Answer: "Listen to the auction". The opponents are silent. West, who was not vulnerable in third seat, couldn't even muster up a light opening.

**Rigal:** 1♥. I've been disciplined for too long. Time to come out and play.

Although this may shock some readers, I think it's a totally reasonable choice, albeit with just three cards. If partner raises hearts, they will almost always have four-card support and you can just pass.

The deal came up at a Trumps session in March 2024. North had ♠AQ4 ♥AJ98 ♦KQ762 ♣4. The layout was very friendly, except for the spade king with East. That meant that on best play, North can make ten tricks in notrump. However, South can only make 7 tricks in notrump, as an initial spade lead through North's ♠AQ is very bad for South players who declare notrump. Both North and South can make 10 tricks with hearts or clubs as trumps. ♠♥◆♠
